BELMONT

Our Kinder class has been talking about the life of Jesus. We learned about his birth at Christmas time and have been following his path up until his death on Good Friday. We heard the parables he told. We shared in the awe of the miracles he performed. We learned about his greatness and how he died for us so that we could be reborn into God's Kingdom. Everyday we read a little bit of his story at carpet time.

Now that the weather is turning nicer, it is a chance to get outside to admire all the wonderful things God has created that come alive in the Spring. We have started doing our Devotions class in the grass, praying in thanks to God for the amazing gifts he gives us with the warmer weather.

Grade 2 explored the story of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, as told in the Gospel of Luke. Our celebrations were rooted in reflection and creativity, helping students connect with the meaning of Easter in a meaningful way. As part of our learning, we engaged in guided reading activities that deepened our understanding of the scripture, and students created thoughtful artwork inspired by the story. We concluded our Easter reflections with a class version of Resurrection Eggs, using visual and hands-on elements to retell the events leading up to Jesus' resurrection. It was a joyful and engaging experience that allowed students to reflect on the significance of Easter in an age-appropriate and memorable.

The grade 5/6 class at Belmont studied the Easter story as it is written in the gospel of Mark. Recently, we have been focused on the Biblical definition of "Truth" with a daily Bible reading and response to a passage on the topic. We've learned that truth is rooted in God's character—He is the source of all truth, as Jesus said in John 14:6, "I am the way and the truth and the life." The Bible also teaches that God's Word is truth (John 17:17), and it provides guidance for how we should live. As part of our learning, students researched Bible passages about truth and responded in their Devotional Journals.

We are fortunate at Belmont that we get to meet as a Logos Program, in the gym, every Tuesday. We sing, dance, pray and worship together as a group. The students love to get together with K-6 at this time. It is wonderful to see how the grade 6 kids interact and are role models for the Kindergarten kids. It is always a good time worshipping together.

School Updates

BRITANNIA

This month we have been continuing to work through the story of Exodus. We have been discussing how even when we don't feel capable, God still calls us to great things - just as he did with Moses.

We have also been planning an end-of-the-year field day for the school. We're hoping for a hot day so we can do some water games! The students are looking forward to serving their classmates in a way that is fun, and builds community.

HARDISTY

We've been reading the first book of the Bible — Genesis — and learning some amazing things! We learned that God made the whole world, and He made each of us to be special, in His image. God purposed for us to have a close relationship with Him. But then sin came in and messed things up, and it separated us from God. The good news is, God didn't leave things that way! He had a plan from the very beginning to beat Satan and bring us back to Him. We have also been enjoying our daily prayer and worship times. God is good!

KENSINGTON

In May, the Grade 3/4 class worked on a special Mother's Day project to honour and appreciate their mothers. As part of this meaningful activity, students engaged in thoughtful discussions about the importance of both mothers and fathers, emphasizing the value of honouring them as taught in Scripture.

The class also explored several Bible verses, including Ephesians 6:1 — "Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right." This verse helped guide students in understanding the importance of showing love, respect, and obedience to their parents, following God's design for family life.

The grade 5/6 students discussed how we can experience moments of disappointment, and how we can turn to God in these times of struggle. Students discussed what causes disappointment, whether it's from unexpected challenges, a poor mark on a test, or losing a game. Students highlighted how disappointment is a part of life and how we can turn to God through prayer to help us navigate these emotions.

This May, our junior high students tackled a topic that's all too familiar: disappointment. Whether it's missing out on something they were looking forward to, dealing with friendship struggles, or facing unexpected challenges, students shared honest reflections on the ways disappointment shows up in everyday life.

Together, we looked at how the Bible speaks into these moments. From the story of Joseph being sold by his brothers, to David waiting years to become king, to the disciples' confusion after Jesus' death—students saw how God often uses disappointment to grow perseverance, deepen trust, and strengthen faith.

One verse that stood out during our discussions was *Romans 5:3-4* — "We also glory in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; perseverance, character; and character, hope." Through prayer, journaling, and conversation, students were encouraged to shift their perspective: to see disappointment not as the end, but as a space where God is still working.

It's been a powerful month of spiritual growth and real-life application. We're proud of the way students have shown emotional maturity and a willingness to trust God in the hard moments.

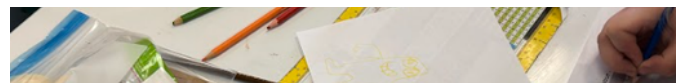
YOUNGSTOWN

April sure was a great month at Youngstown. God is so good. In our Student Testimony Chapel, we heard how God is answering prayers and actively working in the lives of many of our kids. This month, our classes spent time talking, reading (thank you Logos Society for the Jesus Storybook Bibles for our classes) and learning about the significance of Easter. We also participated in whole Logos program morning devotions through google meets the week leading up to Easter weekend. To celebrate and to rejoice in the new life we have through Christ's death and resurrection, all the Logos students participated in rotating through a variety of stations. The 5/6 students got to lead their group of mixed multi-grades from activity to activity; the focus was on the sequence of events that led to Jesus' death and His victorious resurrection. Students were reminded of the foundation of our faith, which is the Father's love and His redemption plan. They looked at our sin, the forgiveness through Jesus and the promise of eternal life. To live out our role in God's story, we have partnered with the Mustard Seed again this year. During one of the Easter stations, students were able to use their time and talents to put together cards and create breakfast bags for the Mustard Seed. What an honour it is for staff and students to come alongside this amazing organization and to help in such a tangible way. In light of the recent tragedy in Vancouver with the Filipino community, we spent time gathered together in prayer lifting up all those affected and for the greater community as well.

QUEEN ALEXANDRA

Queen Alexandra Logos students learned about the story of Easter during Faith Friday stories. From the Triumphal Entry through the Last Supper and the washing of the disciples' feet, Good Friday, and Easter morning. The story ended with some of the highlights from Jesus' 40 days on earth after the resurrection and his ascension to heaven. Classes also completed art to symbolize Jesus' love, sacrifice and resurrection.

This month, for Earth Day, Queen Alexandra students and Strathcona High School students also worked together to plan activities and a fundraiser. Some of the activities included: land-based "sit-spots", Indigenous outdoor games, sales of pins, bracelets and keychains, as well as having a lemonade stand to fundraise for northern communities in Nunavut! Students were leaders and foundational in the planning of our Earth Day activities. They promoted the event by creating posters, game plans/ scripts, and morning announcements to share information with the school community.
